What is a Storyboard?





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- A storyboard is a series of drawing, images, photographs or graphical representations of the scenes that your video will include.
- It helps you to plan, shot by shot, how you will plan, shoot and produce your video.
- A storyboard typically comprises a number of square with drawings or images inserted these drawing represent the scenes you will film at each stage of your video.
- A storyboard can also include directional instructions, notes for the camera operator or even a short piece of script if you are using a script in your video.




1a. Feet walk along Hollywood Boulevard




1b. Turns off Hollywood Boulevard




1c. Through back of Renaissance silhouetted.

Why should you use a Storyboard?

- Storyboards are important for a number of reasons:
 - 1. It can help you to plan the shots and scenes you need to film for your video.
 - 2. It can help you to set the scope for your video the more scenes in your storyboard, the longer and more detailed your video will be.
 - 3. It can help you to share your vision for your video with others on your production team.
 - 4. Planning your video in this way will save you time in the long-run as you will have a clearer idea of the video you are making when you complete your storyboard!





How do you Create a Storyboard?

- To create a storyboard, you need to:
 - 1. Draw a series of blank boxes on a page or you can use the Storyboard template provided by your tutor.
 - 2. Add a short description or script in the notes section for what you want to include in each scene.
 - 3. Sketch out your idea even if you only use stick-men characters, try to draw out your vision for each scene this will help you when you go to set up the shot later on!






Over to You!

- Using the Storyboard Template provided, work in your teams to develop a draft Storyboard for your interview.
- Use this activity to plan where you would like to include cut scenes to footage from past events, footage of modern buildings that once had a different purpose, footage of modern-day towns and cities that can be contrast in the video with photographs or footage from the past, for example.
- These cut scenes will vary based on the subject of your interview but your Storyboard will help you to plan how many cut scenes you need to film.
- Remember no Storyboard is final it is only a tool to help you to plan your video, so you can update it if your filming plans change during production!
